How to Volunteer

Applicants must be:

- 18 years of age,
- Have access to transportation,
- Possess a valid driver's license,
- Be willing to serve a minimum of four 12-hour shifts per month, and
- Submit to background investigations, including fingerprinting.

A 40-hour mandatory training course is required and will be provided to successful applicants. The course is held over an six-week period, during evening hours, and includes observations at Superior Court in Mount Holly. An understanding of domestic violence issues is a plus, as is any bilingual ability.

COMMUNITY MATTERS

The Cycle of Violence is often kept in motion by isolation. Abusers often isolate the victim financially, physically, and emotionally.

Many victims are moved away from family and are discouraged from making close friends. Early on in many abusive relationships the abuser pushes the victim to "choose" between them and the victim's family. They often convince the victim that the family "is just trying to break them up."



As the relationship becomes more abusive many victims feel embarrassed which further distances them from family and friends.

Victims are further isolated financially They are often kept in the dark about any financial information. They have very little access to the family finances and are often not listed on the accounts. The abuser may tell the victim over and over that he/she "could never make it on their own" and the victim may feel trapped in the relationship.


You can Help

Response Teams

Domestic Violence Response Teams are community members committed to breaking the cycle of isolation experienced by many domestic violence victims.

Local Police Departments in collaboration with Providence House, recruit volunteers for their Domestic Violence Response Team (DVRT). Team members work in conjunction with the police to provide victim support, information, and referral at the time of a domestic violence crisis.
